COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is called Urban Geography. What does that mean? The etymology of urban is urbs, derived from Latin, which signified city or town. Urbs contrasted with rus, signifying a rural landscape. From the same etymological Latin roots originate the words urbane-to mean refined and perhaps even sophisticated—and rustic to mean simple, unrefined or rural. Urbanization and globalization processes are intertwined. Since this is an Urban Geography course, we are to study cities from a geographical perspective, or a geographic framework. Our readings will primarily be in the discipline of Geography and we will read recent writings as well as classic works. For the first time in human history, urban dwellers came to outnumber rural residents in the year 2000. The influence of cities extends to nearly every point on the globe. Urban areas, however, differ dramatically from other spaces in their physical structure, economic base, governance patterns, and the lived experiences of their residents. Cities are characterized by striking inequalities in living conditions and varied forms of cultural expression. In short, contemporary cities are vibrant and complex phenomena formed by conflicting social forces and economic processes. This course examines urban settlements and analyzes the processes of urbanization from a global perspective. The goal of this class is to provide students with basic information, concepts and analytical tools to understand contemporary processes of urbanization and urban change. An overriding theme in the course is examining the relationship between global and local factors in these processes. Critical areas of inquiry include the economy of cities, politics, social interaction, urban social movements, land use, and urban structure.

PREREQUISITES

No pre-requisites, but from technological standpoint it will be assumed that students will know the following: Desktop computers and Windows operating system; Web Browsing, MS Excel, MS Word, MS Powerpoint, Save a file to a given drive, Create, name and rename files and folders, Drag and drop files, Send an email attachment, Know/how of CANVAS, Know how/when to log-off/ shutdown, Find a file or folder, Know when it is appropriate to use 'Save as' instead of 'Save', Download files from the web to a given folder Move files between drives, Zip/Unzip a file, Use the start menu to locate and start a softwares, Copy, paste and delete files, Select & print to a printer from Windows application, Make a new folder in an existing folder, Place an image in Microsoft Word/PowerPoint, Use "Help" from within a Windows application

ASSIGNMENTS

- **Readings:** In addition to the assigned text book readings, there will be reading assignments related to the topics discussed in class. The purpose of these additional reading assignments is to make students aware the present issues and current research on the discussed topics. Students need to read the assigned papers on their own and take quiz.
- **Student Presentations:** In addition to the final project presentation, there will be few student presentations in class. The presentation will consist of 10mins powerpoint presentation on the topics assigned (further discussed in class).
- Video Classes: On several occasions, we will watch videos. Each video deals with a different urban issue in a unique setting. The purpose of these videos is to foster connections



between theoretical material and real-world issues. You will be responsible for material presented in these films as well as material from subsequent classroom discussion. This material will be tested on quizzes and you may be asked to call upon these videos in your research assignments. Students are encouraged to take notes during the videos, which will help you in your quizzes.

- **Exams:** There will be one mid-term and one final exam. Dates are provided in the syllabus and details will be discussed in class.
- **Final Project:** Each student group will submit a project proposal and will present a 10-12mins oral presentation on their final project. Details about their final project will be discussed in class.
- **Final paper (Writing emphasis):** Students with writing emphasis will need to submit a final paper along with presenting their project orally. Detailed information about the required structure of the final paper will be discussed during the course.
- No late assignments. Deadlines for submission will not be changed. There will be no makeup exam if you miss quiz/ presentations. Exceptions will be made only in case of sudden sickness, emergency, and scheduling conflict for a university-approved event (only if the student is a participant) with proper proof. There will be no extra credit offered in this course.

FORMAT

This is a face-to-face course. You may be asked to reference materials or participate online through the learning management system CANVAS. If that is the case, you will need your UWL NetID to login to the course from the CANVAS homepage (<u>http://www.uwlax.edu/Canvas/</u>).

LATE ASSIGNMENTS, MISSED EXAMS

Assignments are due on the dates indicated in the Course Schedule. For extenuating circumstances that impact your ability to meet deadlines or participate in class activities, you are responsible for alerting me as soon as possible via email.

Material covered in class, including lecture topics, concepts, readings, internet material, and additional tips, all of which should be noted in your notebook. You should enter class on exact time. Incase of late entrance to the lecture, you are solely responsible to take care of the missing part of the lecture or lab. If you plan to miss a class, you need to inform the instructor 2 hours before the class starts and in that case you will receive 0 point. But if you do not inform the instructor and miss the lecture, -1 will be deducted for each session missed. All these grades will be added to your final grades. Portions missed by you due to your late entrance or absence will not be repeated. In cases where you have a scheduling conflict for a university-approved event, and you need to miss a class, it is your responsibility to notify the instructor at least a week before that day.
